Dear Chairman Obey and Ranking Member Tiahrt:

The undersigned organizations write to urge you to provide at least \$600 million for the Title VII health professions programs and Title VIII nursing workforce development programs in the FY 2011 Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education appropriations bill. This appropriations level is needed if these programs are to fulfill their shared mission of improving the supply, distribution, and diversity of health professionals nationwide.

Through student loans, loan guarantees, and scholarships to students, and grants and contracts to academic institutions, the Title VII and Title VIII programs are the only sources of federal funding dedicated to educating and training providers in interdisciplinary settings to meet the needs of special and underserved populations, as well as to increase minority representation in the health care workforce. As such, these programs are a vital contributor to the health care safety net, not only preparing aspiring professionals to meet the country's workforce needs, but also helping to improve health outcomes across all populations.

The multi-year nature of health professions education and training, coupled with unprecedented existing and looming provider shortages across many disciplines necessitates a continued, reliable investment in the Title VII and Title VIII programs. While we understand that there are many competing priorities in the FY 2011 appropriations bill, it is essential that Congress renews its commitment to the health professions programs to aid in resolving systemic workforce shortages and to help deliver care to the country's most vulnerable communities.

An investment in these programs is not only an investment in the future of the health workforce, but in the future health of the nation. We urge you to fully fund the Title VII and Title VIII programs in the FY 2011 Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education appropriations bill. Your support is greatly appreciated, and we look forward to working with you to ensure the continuation of congressional support for these critical programs.
