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# Letters of Recommendation LORs

- "expert testimony"
- ERAS allows unlimited storage.
- BUT, you can't send more than four to an individual program. (min 3)
- Need to give writers 4-6 weeks in general.
- Some specialties require a "chair letter".

### LORs-What



**Ideally a clinical** faculty in your specialty that knows you well and can clinically attest to your skills in the specialty you have chosen.

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Not Chief Residents

\*\*\*For questions about writers, discuss with your dean.

## LORs-ask Yourself

- Did I do a good job on service?
- Did I develop a good relationship?
- Does person think highly of me?
- Does person care about my future?
- Does person have good communication skills?

## Asking for an LOR

- . Be polita
- "Would you be willing to write a strong letter of
- recommendation for me and include some specific examples of why I would be a good applicant?"
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- · Give them cv,
- Give them cover sheet/instructions.
- Diligently but gently track them.

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## Waiving the Right to See

- Some reviewers think waived letters are more reliable, valid, and straightforward.
- Most applicants seem to comply with waiving.
- Recommended in general-at least by me.

# POINTS TO REMEMBER

Politeness costs nothing and gains everything.

Charm will get you everywhere!

## LOR Points

- At least half of the letters should be from physicians in that specialty.
- Give writers a timeline and gently follow up with them.
- THANK them afterward.

. The MSPE is NOT a LOR.

#### Five Fundamentals

- Clinical content should be the focus rather than prestige of the writer.
- Ask outright if a strong recommendation is possible.
- Give writer a copy of CV and PS.
- Waive your right to see letter.
- Thanks the letter writer.
